If I were Mayor, I would...?

The Indiana Association of Cities and Towns wants to hear your ideas!

Our statewide essay contest for sixth-graders - "If I were Mayor, I would..." - lets you tell others what you would do as the leader of your community to make your city or town the best place to live. Two winning essays will be selected for each of the four Mayors Roundtable Regions (Northern, Northern Central, South Central, and Southern regions). In addition, one essay will be selected from among all entries as the Grand Prize Winner. Each regional winner will receive a \$250 savings bond; the Grand Prize Winner will receive a \$1,000 savings bond.

The nine winning students along with the parents/guardian and a teacher will receive local recognition. Dates and locations will be determined at a later time. The school of the Grand Prize Winner will receive \$100 to be applied as the school's principal designates. The essay contest is open to all Indiana students currently enrolled in the sixth grade or being home educated at the sixth-grade level for the 2010-2011 school year.

Imagine: You are thinking about running for mayor. You are wondering what it would take to run your community and provide the public services your citizens expect. Contest Rules

- Each essay must include a completed Official Entry Form (photocopies accepted), including signature of a teacher/adult verifying that the writing is the work of the student. Essays with incomplete entry forms will be disqualified.
- Essay must address the subject and must begin with "If I were Mayor, I would"
- Essays may not exceed 250 words.
- Only one essay may be submitted per student.
- Essays will be judged on creativity, clarity, sincerity of thought, and proper use of grammar.

Essays must be received by IACT no later than April 15, 2011. Winners will be notified in May

People with Disabilities and Emergency Management

During this Disability Awareness Month, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) would like to remind everyone, including people with disabilities, to plan ahead in order to stay safe during disasters. First, put together an emergency kit with food, water, clothing, a flashlight, batteries, medications, important phone numbers, cash and any other items that you might need during an emergency. Then, make a plan. Think about the types of emergencies that happen most often in your area.

The state of Indiana is prone to flooding, severe storms, tornados, winter storms, extreme temperatures and even earthquakes. How would you respond to each of these hazards? Think about the items and services that you use every day and have a backup plan for accessing those items in an emergency. If you use an agency provider for personal care assistance services or other in-home services, ask about the agency's emergency plan and how they will provide services to you in a disaster. Talk to trusted friends and family members that could assist you if needed and decide how you will contact them. Think about or write down any information that you would want to tell first responders about how to best assist you. Once you have your emergency kit ready and have created your emergency plan, help friends and family members with theirs.

If you want to be even more involved, join a Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) in your area. Now is the time to plan ahead to remain safe, informed and independent during emergencies. For more information, please visit www.ready.gov.







Just what do we mean by "speed dating"

Speed dating is a formalized match-making process whose purpose is to encourage people to meet a large number of new people. We're using this concept to ensure that exhibiting organizations meet EVERY attendee.

- 1. A group of five attendees will start at a table.
- The bell rings and exhibitors give a four minute presentation about their service and programs.
- 3. Attendees have one minute to ask questions, jot down notes, and exchange business cards.
- 4. The bell rings and attendees rotate to the next table.
- 5. The process repeats until each group has been to each exhibit table (approximately two hours).
- After the final "speed dating" round, attendees and exhibitors will participate in a networking activity and will then have approximately 15 minutes to return to the exhibitors' tables to obtain more information, ask additional questions, and continue networking.
